

Attitudes Aren't Free: Defending the Culture of the Military

For many years, liberal civilian activists have been trying to impose their agenda and attitudes on America's military, showing little respect for the armed forces' unique culture and core values. In 1984 President Ronald Reagan honored the veterans of D-Day with a memorable address beneath the cliffs of Pointe du Hoc. In his memorable address, Reagan called attention to special bonds that caused them to "put aside the instinct for self-preservation," in order to accomplish their mission.

Today, the same intangible bonds of trust and cohesion are critical elements that support military culture, meaning "how things are done."
